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## HOUSTON LAND BANK COMPLETES IMPROVEMENTS TO SUNNYSIDE COMMUNITY GARDEN WITH SUPPORT FROM AARP GRANT

Upgrades at a community garden in Houston's Sunnyside neighborhood are complete, offering improved accessibility for gardeners with raised soil beds, better walkways and perimeter lighting.

Funded in part with a \$9,950 grant from the AARP and supported by community volunteers, the Houston Land Bank (HLB) initiated the work at the Harry Holmes Healthy Harvest Community Garden in late summer and completed the improvements in early December. The garden is located on a vacant residential lot owned by HLB at 4646 Brinkley; it is managed by Urban Harvest and community volunteers who grow a variety of produce in more than a dozen gardening beds.

The new improvements raised the beds 8 inches with additional paver stones and soil, making it easier for the gardeners – most of whom are over 50 years old – to reach without bending over. Eight solar lights were installed around the garden's perimeter to improve evening and early morning access, and crushed granite was installed between beds to prevent walkways from turning to mud after heavy rains. New signage in the garden highlights AARP's contribution through its Community Challenge grant program, and four young fig trees planted at the garden's front will increase the garden's production while enhancing streetside appearance. Twelve community volunteers participated in the work, as did five HLB staff; additional support was provided by HLB vendors.

The project concluded with a December 11 community event that drew about 30 people. Limited in size because of the COVID-19 Omicron variant's emergence, the event promoted cross-generational interactions (including children and grandparents) centered around gardening activities, and also offered information regarding financial literacy and homeownership opportunities available through HLB.

"This has been a great project, thanks to AARP's financial support and the hard work of our friends at the community garden. The Harry Holmes Healthy Harvest garden will make it even easier for Sunnyside residents to use this community resource for better access to healthy food. HLB staff including Vice President Jen Allison were critical to finalizing these important improvements through the challenges of the newest COVID-19 wave," noted Gonzalo Gonzalez, HLB's chief operating officer and interim chief executive officer.
